

A POPPY HISTORY


The first donations for artificial poppies were given in Britain on 11th November 1921, inspired by John McCrae's 1915 poem 'In Flanders' Fields'.

Some of the bloodiest fighting of World War 1 took place in the Flanders and Picardy regions of Northern France. In the aftermath of the war's total devastation the only thing which would grow on the land was the poppy. McCrae, a doctor serving there with the Canadian Armed Forces, wrote about what he saw.

Moina Michael, an American War Secretary with the YMCA, was moved by McCrae's work to write: "And now the torch and Poppy red, wear in honour of our dead."

She bought red poppies and sold them to her friends to raise money for Servicemen in need. Her French colleague, Madame Guerin, proposed the making of artificial poppies and their sale to help ex-Servicemen and their dependants.

In Britain, Major George Howson, a young infantry officer, formed the Disabled Society, to help disabled ex-Servicemen and women from World War I. Howson suggested to the Legion that members of the Disabled Society could make poppies and the Poppy Factory was subsequently founded in 1922.



THE STORY OF HILL 112


GILLES OSMONT PRESIDENT COTE 112 ASSOCIATION

The Cote 112 Association is a group of wonderful locals from Normandy who maintain and look after the memorials on Hill 112. The following article was written by Gilles setting out the action at Hill 112 during the day subsequent to the D-Day landing in June 1944.

The original plan by the Allies was to take the strategically important town of Caen in the first days following the D-Day landing. This was impossible and frustrating, so on June 18th 1944 Montgomery issued a directive for the capture of the high ground south-west of the town between the Orne and Odon rivers.

This high ground overlooked the city and taking this position would make the German positions in Caen untenable and force them to withdraw. The top of this high ground is named "Hill112" on the Allies maps, not so much a hill but a high point on a long, low ridge. Unimposing as it looked, Hill 112's tactical importance was the view it gave over the countryside to the south, west and east of Caen, and had prompted Rommel before the invasion to remark that should the Allies land in the area that "the one who control Hill 112 will be the one who controls Normandv"

The attack was due to start on 22nd June, and was given the code-name "Epsom".



The Germans had established a strong defense using their best available troops, the I and II SS Panzer Korps. The British VIII Corps start line for the attack was along the Caen-Bayeux railway. However bad weather delayed the operation, and only by the 25th of June the 4 divisions to attack were ready: 7th Armoured Division, 11th Armoured, 15th Scottish and 43rd Wessex.



The attack started on the morning of the 26th by the 15th Scottish Division. The SS defenders forced the Scottish to advance very slowly, and eventually the Scots moved into the village of Baron just to the south of the river at the foot of Hill 112. The 11th Armoured Division then took over and pushed up to the top of the hill, they were immediately ambushed by the 12th SS Panzer Division Grenadiers, who were dug in there and although they successfully beat off three German counter attacks, they were unable to gain complete control of the summit.

Despite further attacks, on the 29th of June the British Forces were forced to withdraw almost everywhere against strong German counter-attacks. Allied intelligence identified the German 9th 10th and 12th SS Divisions and was fully expecting a major counter-attack, so all armoured forces were withdrawn south of the river, and the SS again reoccupied Hill 112.

The capture of Hill 112 was still considered as an absolute necessary to take Caen, so a second operation

code named "Jupiter" was planned for July 10th. In this attack the British 43rd Wessex Division was to attack positions held by the 10th SS Panzer Division supported by the 102nd SS Heavy Tank Battalion equipped with Tiger Tank. Despite a massive prebombardment, the British Churchill, Cromwell and Sherman tanks supporting the Wessex Division were no match for the Tiger tanks and the attack immediately stalled. After the 9th SS Panzer Division were brought back to reinforce the 10th SS Division. already engaged, the British forces were unable to take the summit and the British attacks were finally halted on July 22nd. In the twelve days of Operation Jupiter the 43rd Wessex Division suffered 7.000 casualties. about 40% of the Division.

Several other British operations were conducted in the Odon valley during July, but it was only finally on the night of August 4th, after the Germans withdrew during Operation Cobra and Operation Bluecoat further west, that a patrol from the 53rd Welsh Division discovered that with Caen no longer in their control, Hill 112 had lost its importance for the German defenders and they had withdrawn, allowing the 53rd Division to finally occupy the high ground without a shot being fired.

A stone memorial to the 43rd Division was built on the hill in the late 1940s. In 2000, a Churchill tank was installed on the site,





thanks to the huge efforts of veteran Albert Figg who managed to organize a funding of this operation. This was to commemorate all the tank crew killed during action for Hill 112.

Having continued relentlessly with his fund raising in July 2015 a Statue of a WW2 Infantryman was installed to commemorate all the infantrymen that have fallen during the campaign and a '25-pounder' field gun to commemorate all the artillery.

Particularly significant to Albert, as he was a Sergeant in the 112 Field Regiment (Artillery) of the 43rd Wessex Divison and in charge of a '25-pounder', which he and his men were firing from Carpiquet airport over Hill 112 during the campaign.

Finally in 2016 a plantation of 112 "liberty trees" will be planted in the shape of a Maltese Cross.

Albert now feels that all divisions have now been properly remembered and the history can be told for future generations.

We from Cote 112 Association feel deeply indebted to Albert and his efforts.



IN FLANDERS FIELDS

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.


